



EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL INITIATIVE



In 2003, the Foundation for California Community Colleges received the first of two grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to act as an intermediary in the nationwide Early College High School Initiative. Early college high schools (ECHSs) are partnerships between small high schools and postsecondary institutions that target underrepresented youth previously at risk of not attending college, such as first-generation college-goers and those from low-income and minority backgrounds. ECHS students have the opportunity to earn a high school diploma and up to two years of college credit in five years or less at no cost. The credit can be used to complete an associate's degree, transfer to a four-year institution, or certify in a vocation that provides a family-sustaining wage.

Innovative Education

The program is designed to increase college access and affordability for students who may not have considered college previously. Students enrolled in an ECHS begin taking college-level courses on partner Community

College campuses as soon as they show they are ready, sometimes as early as ninth grade. By taking college courses for free through an ECHS, students cut down on the time needed to complete a bachelor's degree and can eliminate up to two years of tuition.

As an intermediary, the Foundation selects the college – high school district partnerships, assists in school planning, provides ongoing technical assistance, and coordinates and facilitates professional and partnership development activities.

Expanding Opportunities

Under the first grant for 15 schools, the Foundation opened its first ECHS in Modesto in September 2003. In 2007, the Foundation received a second grant to establish formal partnerships between eight existing Gates Foundation-funded high schools and local Community Colleges. In all, the Foundation sponsors 23 high schools from San Diego to Eureka, making it the largest ECHS intermediary in California and the second-largest nationwide.

In 2008, the earliest Foundation-sponsored schools held their first graduations. Six schools graduated a total of 178 seniors, including nine students who also received their associate's degrees. Of the graduates, 62 have transferred to four-year institutions and 69 are continuing their higher education at the partner Community College.
